



Welcome to the latest North West Coastal Access Update 19 April 2022



England Coast Path in the North West

Progress so far:

- We now have 132 km of the England Coast Path open in the North West – from Allonby to Green Road, and around Walney Island.
- Of the remaining full stretches, Cleveleys to Pier Head (117km) is now approved in full but not yet open, with establishment works planned.

Gretna to Allonby (100 km) - approved in part

Current Activity

- A hearing took place in early December 2017. The determination process for this stretch was, like 14 others around the country, delayed by the implications of the 'People over Wind' case. However, as required, we have now updated the Habitats Regulations Assessment for our original proposals and three parts of the stretch have now been approved.
- Cumbria County Council are planning establishment works for the approved sections (Gretna to Kirkandrewsupon-Eden; Bowness-on-Solway to Anthorn; Rumbling Bridge to Allonby).

Next Milestone

- Secretary of State will consider the remaining objections and representations before deciding on whether to approve each of these with or without modifications.
- Access rights will commence once establishment work is completed.

Whitehaven to Silecroft (49km) - England Coast Path open

Due to the COVID restrictions, we held a 'soft' local launch of the new coastal access rights in March – and were finally able to follow this up with a celebratory event in St Bees on 22nd September 2021.

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Silecroft to Silverdale (112 km) - approved in part

Current Activity

- Report 1 (Silecroft to Green Road station) was approved by the Secretary of state in November 2020, and access rights commenced on Wednesday 9th February 2022, following completion of establishment works by Cumbria County Council.
- Reports 2-6 (Green Road station to Cove Well, Silverdale) are awaiting decisions from the Secretary of State.
- The period for making objections and representations for the published proposals for this stretch closed on 4 March 2020. To see the proposals go to:

Next Milestone

- Secretary of State will consider the remaining objections and representations submitted in relation to Reports 2 – 6 before deciding on whether to approve each individual report with or without modifications.
- Once approved, Cumbria County Council will commence establishment work on the remaining parts of the stretch between the Duddon Estuary and Silverdale.
- Access rights will commence once establishment work is completed.

Silverdale to Cleveleys (87.6 km) - approved in part

Current Activity

Next Milestone

- We have collated the responses to our reports and forwarded them to PINS and the Secretary of State for consideration.
- The Secretary of State has approved three of the six reports so far:
 - Report 2 (Wild Duck Hall, Bolton-le-Sands to Ocean Edge Caravan Park, Heysham),
 - Report 4 (Carlisle Bridge, Lancaster to Glasson Dock Swing Bridge) and
 - Report 6 (Fluke Hall Lane car park, Pilling to South Promenade, Cleveleys).
- Lancashire County Council may now commence establishment work on these parts of the stretch.
- Secretary of State will consider the remaining objections and representations submitted in relation to Reports 1, 3 and 5 before deciding on whether to approve each individual report with or without modifications.
- Access rights will commence once establishment work is completed.





Cleveleys to Pier Head, Liverpool (116.5 km) – approved in full	
Current Activity Next Milestone	
 The Secretary of State approved all remaining subsidiary lengths within this stretch on 6th April 2022. Lancashire County Council, Sefton Metropolitan Borough Council and other relevant bodies may now commence establishment work on this stretch.  The period for making objections and representations for the published proposals for this stretch closed on 10th February 2021. Cleveleys to Pier Head approved in full

Following approval of the three uncontested subsidiary lengths of our Cleveleys to Pier Head proposals, the Secretary of State has now approved the remaining three lengths. This follows recommendations from the Planning Inspectorate that, where objections were lodged, Natural England had not failed to achieve a fair balance in its decision making. However, it is vital that responsible access is encouraged so that visitors can explore the Cumbrian coast confident in the knowledge they are looking after the natural environment and respecting the local communities and farmers who host these new trails.

We strongly encourage you to make use of Natural England and Defra's Countryside Code Refresh Partner Toolkit, available via Dropbox. This includes copies of the Code and signage which you can download, print and use in your local area, in communications and in print and digital/social media. You can adapt these to suit your own audience needs, using the Code as the starting point for conversations and engagement.

Walkers and visitors can also download GPX files of the route for use with smartphones and GPS devices, and find answers to the most common questions about the trail and how to access it responsibly.
